HARRY JAMES DRIVAS CLASS OF 1954

One of the many outstanding Lowell High School athletes of the 1950's, Harry Drivas was one of the catalysts of the most successful period of gridiron achievement in the school's history--the golden years of legendary Coach Ray Riddick's Red Raiders.

During the 1952 season Harry passed for 691 yards and 7 touch-downs and ran for two more scores as Lowell won the Massachuestts State Class A Championship and then scored a decisive 26-12 victory in the Piedmont Bowl in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, en route to an overall 11-0 record.

As team captain during the 1953 season Harry continued his stellar play. The standout quarterback threw for 733 yards (7th on the all-time LHS list) and a school record 13 touchdowns (still 1st on the all-time list), in addition to running for 2 touchdowns as the Red and Gray captured its 2nd consecutive State Class A Championship, completing an undeteated 9-0 season. Harry was the prime mover of an offense that totaled 307 points, the 2nd highest total in school history.

For his career Harry compiled a perfect 20-0 record as starting quarterback. His career total of 20 touchdown passes still stands as Lowell High School record. Harry's career total of 1,424 yards passing ranks 3rd on the all-time LHS list.

A versatile athlete, Harry also competed as a member of the LHS basketball and baseball teams during his years at Lowell High School.

Upon graduation from Lowell High, Harry enrolled at the University of Connecticut. At Storrs he played four years of football, earning All-Conference honors.

Harry remained involved in athletics in his professional career, as a teacher/coach and athletic director in Florida.



CAMILLE (BUTCH) FREDIANI CLASS OF 1961

Blessed with outstanding quickness, Camille "Butch" Frediani etched a permanent place for himself in the annals of Lowell High School athletics through his exploits on the football field and the track under the tutelage of legendary Hall of Fame coaches Ray Riddick and George "Mike" Haggerty.

Utilizing his blazing speed effectively on the gridiron, Butch was a standout two-way halfback for the Red Raiders during his tenure on Kirk Street. Always a threat to score from anywhere on the field, Butch was at his best during his senior season (1960). During that campaign the talented back regularly flirted with and sometimes surpassed the magic 100-yard barrier in yards rushing. Highlights included a 144-yard effort in a victory over Peabody and a 143-yard performance (punctuated by a 49-yard touchdown burst) against archrival Lawrence in a 14-14 tie. Other long TD's included a 69-yarder against intracity rival Keith Academy and a 78-yard kickoff return versus Nashua.

Butch was named the Most Valuable Player of the Lowell-Lawrence game in 1960 and was a starting halfback for the Greater-Lowell All-Stars in the annual Lowell Sun Charities Game in the summer of 1961. Butch received the ultimate honor for a high school athlete when the Sporting News named him to its High School All-American Football team following the 1960 season.

On the track Butch was a four-year standout sprinter for the Red and Gray, regularly winning races at distances ranging from 30-yards to 220-yards and setting numerous records during his stellar career.



RICHARD R. FREITAS **CLASS OF 1971**

Another of legendary Coach George Bossi's outstanding wrestlers, Rick Freitas compiled an incredible record in Massachusetts, New England, and nationally at both the

high school and college levels.

A three-year varsity wrestler for Lowell High School (1969-1971), Rick culminated his high school career by winning the Massachusetts State Championship at 134 pounds during the 1970-1971 season. Rick led the Red and Gray in team points, takedowns, and falls as the Raider juggernaut rolled to both State and New England Championships that winter.

After graduation from LHS Rick attended Tabor Academy where he won the New England Prep Championship at 156 pounds, leading Tabor to the New England Prep team

Championship.

After graduation from Tabor Rick enrolled at wrestling powerhouse Boston University. As a freshman Rick was undefeated in dual meets (13-0, school record 12 falls). For the third consecutive year Rick was a member of an undefeated team (16-0). Individually Rick won the New England Championship at 134 pounds, was voted Outstanding Wrestler at the New Englands, and qualified for the NCAA Championship--all firsts for the Terriers.

Rick received Freshman All-American honors after this remarkable season.

Rick eventually transferred to Montclair (NJ) State College, where he continued his incredible performances. Rick was a two-time 142-pound conference champion as Montclair won team conference honors in consecutive seasons. The crowning achievement of Rick's career occurred in 1977 when he won the NCAA Division III 142-pound Championship (the first Massachusetts wrestler to win an NCAA title), leading Montclair State to the NCAA team Championship with an NCAA record 143 points. Named to the NCAA All-American team, Rick was named Montclair State's Outstanding Senior Athlete.

Rick compiled a final career college record of 65-12-0 and an overall career

record of 133-19-0 with 75 falls.

Rick's excellence as a wrestler continued into a coaching career at Upsala College and UMass, Amherst, where his teams included 15 NCAA qualifiers and 8 conference champions.



CHRISTOPHER GREEN CLASS OF 1989

One of the most versatile athletes in the storied history of Lowell High School, Christopher Green competed in no fewer than five sports--baseball, football, track, golf, and basketball--during his years as a Red Raider, winning varsity letters in four of them.

One of the most devastating hitters during the long tenure of LHS Baseball Coach George Cunha, Chris struck fear into Merrimack Valley Conference pitchers during his varsity career. Chris's career statistics include a .407 batting average, 7 home runs, 37 runs batted in, and a slugging percentage of .862--all among the best in the diamond history of LHS. The two-time LHS Most Valuable Player and MVC All-Conference selection dominated the area's pitchers during his senior season (1989), compiling a .448 batting average while hammering 4 home runs and garnering 18 runs batted in. Named MVC Co-Player of the Year and Lowell Sun Player of the Year after this outstanding performance, Chris was selected as a member of the Boston Globe's All-Scholastic team.

A stalwart two-way player for Coach Walter Nelson's Red and Gray football teams, Chris was named to the Merrimack Valley All-Conference team as a defensive tackle in 1988.

Completing a rare "triple" during his senior year at Lowell High School, Chris was named MVC All-Conference in the Shot Put during the Indoor Track campaign, thereby achieving the rare distinction of earning MVC All-Conference honors three times in one year.

Not surprisingly, Chris received the prestigious Lowell High School Athletic Valedictory Award in 1989, presented to the Outstanding Male Athlete during his tenure at LHS.

Chris continued his athletic career at the University of Massachusetts, Lowell as a member of both the baseball and football teams. Chris was named an All-Conference offensive tackle as a member of UMass, Lowell's Eastern Regional Championship team under Coach Dennis Scannell in 1991.

Chris joins his father Walter Timothy Green, LHS '68 (a 1994 inductee) as the first father-son pair in the Hall of Fame.



JENNIFER BURNS MARTIN CLASS OF 1990

Perhaps the most honored female athlete in the Annals of Lowell High School, Jennifer Burns Martin achieved significant honors at the local, state and national levels while leading the Red and Gray Swim team to the most successful period in history.

Prior to her entrance into Lowell High School (and throughout her attendance there) Jennifer competed for the Lowell High based New Wave Swim Club. She competed at the Junior National and Junior Olympic Championships highlighted by a 6th place finish in the 100 meter backstroke at the J. O.'s in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Among her most treasured victories was a defeat of current 5-time Olympic Gold Medal winner Jenny

Thompson in a New England Championship meet.

-As a member of Coach Barbara Smith's Lowell High Swim team in the late 1980's, Jennifer left an indelible mark on the school's record book, one that might never be equaled. A 4-time team MVP and Lowell Sun All-Star (3-time Sun Swimmer of the Year), Jennifer also earned Merrimack Valley All-Conference honors 4 consecutive years. At her best in championship meets, Jennifer was a 6-time Massachusetts State Champion, including 3 consecutive 100-yd. backstroke titles (1987-1989) and 2 consecutive titles as a member of the LHS 200-yd. medley relay squad--with teammates Ellen Martin, Julie McGuirk, and Kara Kouloheras (1988-1989). During her senior season (1989) Jen, the Red Raider Captain, led the Raiders to MVC and North Sectional Championships (ending powerhouse Acton-Boxboro's 8-year reign in the latter). Additionally, Jen set a Massachuestts State Record in the 100 backstroke and sparked the 200 medley relay team to a State Record as well. The 3-time Boston Globe and Boston Herald All-Scholastic received the prestigious Lowell High School Athletic Valedictory Award in 1990. Upon graduation Jen held no fewer that 7 Lowell High School Records.

Jennifer also was a member of the Lowell High School Eastern Mass Class A State

Champion Outdoor Track team in 1987.

Upon graduation Jennifer received a swim scholarship to the University of Pittsburg, where she continued her natatorial exploits. A 4-time All Big East Conference selection, Jennifer was Pittsburg team Captain during the 1993-1994 season. She was the Panthers' leading point scorer at the Big East Championships during that season and a member of Pitt's Big East Championship 400-meter freestyle relay team. Jennifer was selected as a member of the Big East Athletic Directors Honors List of Academic Achievement for her combined academic and athletic excellence.

In 1994 Jennifer was chosen as winner of the Blue Gold Award, presented to one senior woman (from all sports) for athletic achievement, academic excellence, leadership, and dedication to the University. In recognition of this prestigious honor, Jennifer's name is now inscribed in stone in the Varsity Walk along with past honorees, such as Olympians Sue Heon and Roger Kingdom, NFL Hall of Famers Mike Ditka and Tony Dorsett, and ex-Miami

Dolphins QB Dan Marino.

JOHN E. LANG, Sr. CLASS OF 1939

Affectionately known to teammates and members of the teams that he coached by the colorful and appropriate nickname "Feet," John Lang enjoyed a long relationship with the Lowell High School Track and Cross Country programs. Beginning with his career as a standout middle distance runner on Hall of Fame Coach George "Mike" Haggerty's Lowell Track teams of the late 1930's and continuing again during his tenure as Red and Gray Boys Cross Country and Track and Field Coach from 1967-1986, John was a fixture on the local track scene.

During his competitive years at Lowell High (1938-1939) John was a standout under Coach Haggerty, regularly winning the 1000- and 880-yd. runs and occasionally the 600-yd. run in interscholastic competition. Among the highlights were a victory in the 880 over a strong field representing all areas of New England in a New England A.A.U. meet in Malden and a strong 4th place finish in the 1000 against a stellar field in the elite Eastern Seaboard Relay Carnival at Boston Garden, improving his previous best time in the event by an incredible 10 seconds! John was also a regular victor in Lowell High's dual meets.

John also enjoyed considerable success in the highly competitive Lowell City Track Meets at the Paige Street Annex, on one occasion scoring a rare double, winning both the 600- and 1000-yd. runs against strong competition.

After graduation John attended St. John's Prep in Danvers where he continued his running exploits under Lowell High Hall of Famer Jim Daley. In what was undoubtedly the highlight of his running career John was a member of the St. John's 2 mile relay team which captured the National Title at the National Catholic Preparatory School Championships in Jersey City, New Jersey in 1941.

During his tenure as Track and Cross Country Coach for the Red and Gray John combined his considerable expertise with a quiet wit and infinite patience that inspired a generation of student-athletes. Included among the members of his teams were future Hall of Famers Rod Redman, Jr., Kevin Crocker, Tom Whalen, Peter Quinlan, Tracy Mitchell, Richard Gauthier, Frank Elliott, Tim

Green, Steve Bilby, Paul Lanoue, and Bob Hodge.



DONALD J. GIUFFRIDA CLASS OF 1956

One of the truly outstanding two-way lineman in the long and storied history of the Lowell High School Football program, Don Giuffrida played an integral role in the successes of legendary Hall of Fame Coach Ray Riddick's Red and Gray juggernauts of the mid-1950's.

Don was a member of Coach Riddick's Red Raider Varsity teams for his

four years at Lowell High.

Beginning with his sophomore year and continuing through his senior season (1953-1955), Don compiled a remarkable record for durability. Over that three season period Don started at guard or tackle and played every down of every game (both offensively and defensively), including special teams, a true "iron man" accomplishment.

Don was a member of three consecutive Lowell High State Championship teams (1952-53-54) and played in 32 consecutive Red and Gray victories. Don played in the Piedmont Bowl post-season game in Winston-Salem, NC,

after the 1954 season.

Given the leadership qualities inherent in his durability and consistency, it is no surprise that Don captained both the 1955 Lowell High team and the Greater-Lowell All-Star team in the annual summer <u>Lowell Sun</u> Charity Classic vs. the Greater-Lawrence All-Stars.

Don was voted the Most Outstanding Offensive Lineman in the 1955 contest against arch-rival Lawrence. Later he was voted Lowell's Most Valuable Player for the 1955 season.

Don received All-State Football honors after both his junior (1954) and

senior (1955) seasons, a rare feat.

After graduation Don enrolled at West Virginia University. Elected as Co-Captain of the Freshman team in 1956, Don was instrumental in the Mountaineers' undefeated 9-0 season.



STEPHEN ANTHONY BEATI CLASS OF 1982

Another of the outstanding proteges of legendary Lowell High School wrestling coach George Bossi, Stephen Beati established himself as one of the most dominant grapplers in the long and storied history of the Red and Gray wrestling program.

During his three years as a varsity wrestler for the Red and Gray Steve established himself as a force at the local, state, and New England level. He was described by Coach Bossi as "one of the best kids I have ever worked with in

terms of overall ability."

As a sophomore (1979-1980) Steve was runner-up in the prestigious Lowell Holiday Tournament. After winning the Division I Sectional Tournament, Steve worked his way through a difficult draw in the 100-lb. weight class to become Lowell High School's first sophomore State Champion. Steve culminated his season with a 2nd place at the New England Championships.

During his junior season (1980-1981) Steve was crowned 107-lb. Champion at the Lowell Holiday Tournament. Later in the season Steve repeated as Division I sectional Champion. At the State Championships Steve was forced to default in the finals due to a severe bout with the flu. The next week Steve gained a measure of revenge, defeating the state champion on his way to winning the New England Championship at 107 lbs. Steve earned

Boston Globe All-Scholastic honors after this outstanding season.

As a senior (1981-1982) Steve culminated his high school career in excellent fashion. After winning his 2nd consecutive Lowell Holiday Tournament title and his 3rd straight Divisional I Sectional Championship (Outstanding Wrestler - 115 lbs), Steve won the "unofficial" Massachusetts State Tournament 115-lb. Championship. Only the unofficial status of the State Tournament and the absence of a New England that year due to Proposition 21/2 prevented Steve from further accomplishments. Still, Steve (the 1981-1982 Lowell High Team Captain) was again chosen as a Boston Globe All-Scholastic, as well as Lowell Sun Wrestler-of-the-Year. His overall record for the season was an incredible 33-1.

A true student-athlete, Steve was a 2-year member of the National Honor society at Lowell High School. After graduation he enrolled at Harvard University, where he continued his wrestling career until his graduation in 1987.



KATIE STEWART FRECHETTE CLASS OF 1986

One of the most versatile Lowell High School athletes of the 1980's, Katie Stewart Frechette won a total of 12 varsity letters in three sports--Cross Country, Basketball, and Outdoor Track---not only by her ability but also through her dedication and hard work.

A four-year member of the Cross Country team, Katie consistently performed at a high level not only in dual meets but also in Sectional and Division I State competition. Chosen as Team Captain during her senior season (1985), Katie also earned Merrimack Valley Conference All-Star honors that year.

As one of the stalwarts of Coach Bob Boehm's Red and Gray Basketball teams from 1982-1986, Katie made significant impacts on both the team and the LHS Hoop record book as she helped Lowell achieve considerable success in the always competitive Merrimack Valley Conference. A three-time MVC All-Star selection (1983-84, 1984-85, 1985-86), Katie also received All-Conference and Lowell Sun All-Star status in 1995-96. She was also the team's Most Valuable Player that season. Called "... an inspiration to her teammates" by Coach Boehm, Katie helped the Raiders make school history in 1994-95 with the program's 1st ever appearance in the Eastern Mass Division I North Tournament. Katie's name appears in the top 10 with considerable regularity in the LHS Girls Basketball Record Book in a variety of categories such as Games Played (ranked 1st), Season and Career Rebounds (ranked 4th and 3rd, respectively)' and Career Points Scored (ranked 7th), among others.

As a member of Coach Jim McGuirk's Outdoor Track teams for her four years at Lowell High, Katie was a consistent dual meet winner at a variety of events ranging from the 800 meters to the triple jump. Katie was at her best in the major meets. She twice (1984 and 1986) won silver medals as a member of Lowell's 4 x 400 meter relay team at the Northern Area Sectional Championships in 1986. Katie received Merrimack Valley Conference All-Star honors in the triple jump (1985) and the 4 x 400 meter relay (1986). She also was a member of two Lowell High School Record relay teams (4 x 200 meter and triple

jump).

Outside the athletic arena, Katie maintained a high academic record and served as Class President for all four of her years at Lowell High School.



JAMES P. KENNEDY CLASS OF 1987

Referred to by legendary Lowell High School Wrestling Coach George Bossi as one of "the best I ever coached," Jim Kennedy earned honors at the local, state, and national levels spanning his school and college careers.

Jim illustrated the promise of things to come during his freshman year (1983-1984), compiling a 35-5 record on his way to a 3rd place finish at the State Tourna-

ment.

As a sophomore (1984-1985) Jim's season was off to an auspicious start when he placed 1st in the 121-lb. weight class at the prestigious Lowell Holiday

tournament. A subsequent injury, however, curtailed his season.

During Jim's junior year (1985-1986) his success increased. On his way to compiling a record of 34-3-1, he followed 2nd place finishes at both the Division I Sectional and State Tournaments by winning the New England Championships at 135 lbs. He earned <u>Boston Herald</u> All-Scholastic honors at the conclusion of the season.

As a senior (1986-1987) Jim compiled one of the most outstanding seasons in the storied history of Lowell High School Wrestling. Jim finished the season undefeated with a total overall record of 45-0. Competing primarily in the 141-lb. weight class, Jim won numerous tournaments, including the Lowell Holiday, Wayland, Merrimack Valley Conference, and the North Sectional. He culminated his season by winning the 141-lb. Championships at both the Massachusetts and New England Tournaments. A consensus All-Scholastic, Jim was named as Wrestler-of-the-Year by both the Boston Globe and the Boston Herald. For his entire high school career Jim compiled an incredible overall record of 125 wins, 9 losses, and 1 tie.

During high school Jim was also active in summer wrestling. He won three New England Greco-Roman Championships and four New England Freestyle Championships, as well as an Eastern States Greco-Roman Championship in 1986. He participated in five National Junior Tournaments, twice winning All-American honors in Junior National Wrestling. He was the 1st Massachusetts wrestler ever to earn such

an honor.

After graduation Jim continued his mat exploits at Clarion State and the University of Massachusetts at Lowell. At UMass Lowell, Jim was a 3-time New England Champion at 150-lbs. A 2-time NCAA Regional Champion and Tournament Most Outstanding Wrestler, Jim's collegiate career culminated when he achieved All-American honors in 1990 and Academic All-American honors in 1991.

Jim also qualified for the XXIV Olympic Trials in 1988.

GEORGE BOSSI

One of the most highly successful coaches of the entire 100-plus year history of Lowell High School Athletics, George Bossi has earned renown at the local, state, regional, and national levels during a career that has spanned 5 decades as Lowell High's wrestling coach.

During George's tenure at the helm of the Red and Gray's wrestling program (from its inception in 1966, with a 3-year hiatus from 1995-1998 while he served as Lowell's Athletic Director), his teams have compiled over 600 dual meet victories against schedule annually including opponents from among

the state's elite programs.

During the post-season George's teams have achieved an even more remarkable record. In addition to capturing 13 Division I North Sectional crowns, the Raiders have won an incredible 11 Massachusetts State Team Championships (1968, 1971, 1973, 1974, 1975, 1978, 1980, 1981, 1987, 1989, and 2002) and 4 New England Team Championships (1970, 1973, 1975, and 1987) under George's leadership.

During the course of his phenomenal success George has coached 59 individual Massachusetts State Champions and 21 individual New England

Champions.

Many of his wrestlers have continued on to successful collegiate careers, earning All-New England, All-American and even NCAA Championship honors. Several have successfully pursued coaching careers at the high school and college levels.

During recent years, George has been honored for his efforts and achievements by his induction into both the Massachusetts and the National

High School Wrestling Coaches Halls of Fame.

George joins many of his former wrestlers in the Lowell High School Athletic Hall of Fame--including Rodney Redman, Frank Elliott, Richard "Gauch" Gauthier, Jeff Lambert, Paul Lanoue, Cliff Whalen, Earle McQuaide, Rick Freitas, James Kennedy, Stephen Beati, and George Kacavas.



GEORGE KACAVAS CLASS OF 1975

Considered by many local wrestling aficionados as perhaps the single most talented performer during the tenure of Hall of Fame Coach George Bossi, George Kacavas compiled career statistics at both the high school and collegiate levels that might well substantiate that belief.

As a standout for Coach Bossi's powerhouse teams of the mid-1970's, George enjoyed perhaps the most remarkable career of any wrestler in the storied history of the

Lowell High School program.

During his sophomore year (1972-1973) George compiled an undefeated dual meet season in the 101-lb. weight class. In the post-season George placed 2nd in the North Sectional Meet and garnered a 4th place in the Massachusetts State Championships as the Raiders won the team championship. Making George's accomplishments more remarkable was the fact that his actual weight during the season hovered around the 80-lb. level!

As a junior (1973-1974) George finished the season undefeated (38-0) in the 101-lb. weight class, winning the Lowell Holiday and the North Sectional (Outstanding Wrestler) Tournaments before culminating his season by winning both Massachusetts State and New England Interscholastic Championships as the Red and Gray won their 2nd

consecutive State Team Championship.

Incredibly, George's senior year (1974-1975) was even more impressive. Now competing in the 106-lb. weight class, George again finished the season undefeated. For the 2nd consecutive year George won Lowell Holiday and North Sectional Tournament titles. He then went on to win his 2nd consecutive Massachusetts State and New England Interscholastic Championships, winning the Outstanding Wrestler Award at the State Championships. Lowell Won its 3rd consecutive Massachusetts State Team Championship and also the New England Team Championship. At the conclusion of the season George was named to the National High School All-American Team. He took part in the Pittsburgh Olde News Boy Classic, which pitted wrestlers from all over the United States against Pennsylvania's best. George defeated the two-time reigning Pennsylvania High School Champion, thus becoming the only Massachusetts wrestler ever to win this tournament.

At the collegiate level, George competed for both Montclair (NJ) State and Louisiana State University. At Montclair State (1975-1976) George won the Metro Conference Championship and placed 3rd in the NCAA Division III Championships, earning All-American honors and a "Key to the City" of Montclair. At Division I power LSU George recorded 3rd (1977) and 4th (1978) place finishes in the Southeastern Conference Cham-

pionships.



MICHAEL GREGORY BERTOS CLASS OF 1986

Perhaps the most accomplished soccer player in the history of the Lowell High School program, Michael Bertos earned significant honors at the local, state and national levels during his careers at both Lowell High and later at Division I NCAA power Boston University. Mike's achievements have served as a

benchmark for future generations of Red and Gray soccer players.

A four-year varsity player, Mike established both Lowell High School single season (1985) and career (1982-1985) scoring records. The 1984 and 1985 team Most Valuable Player served as Red Raider team captain during his senior season (1985). Locally, Mike was selected as a Lowell Sun All Star (1984) and Player of the Year (1985). In addition, Mike was chosen as the Merrimack Valley Conference Player of the Year in 1985 after garnering MVC 1st team All-Conference honors in both 1983 and 1984.

During his senior season Mike achieved several noteworthy honors. Chosen as the recipient of the prestigious John Beaulieau award as Lowell High School's outstanding male senior athlete, Mike also was honored by Boston TV Channel 7 as a recipient of its "Super 7" award as Massachusetts's outstanding male scholar/athlete of the week (10/85). Mike was named to the Boston Globe's All-Scholastic Division I 1st team at the conclusion of the 1985 cam-

paign.

Mike was also a member of the varsity basketball and track teams dur-

ing his tenure at Lowell High School.

After graduation Mike continued his exploits at Boston University. An All-New England Division I selection in both 1988 and 1989, Mike was both the leading scorer and Most Valuable Player of the highly competitive North Atlantic Conference during each of those seasons. Finishing his Terrier career as the school's 2nd leading all-time scorer, Mike led Boston University to 2 NCAA Division I Tournament appearances. Mike served as BU's captain during the 1989 season. Mike was an assistant coach for the Terriers during the 1991 season.

After playing soccer professionally both in Lowell and in Greece (1990-1993), Mike has successfully pursued a career in medicine. He currently is an

M.D. in Lowell.



THOMAS LAFFERTY CLASS OF 1988

A rare three-sport standout during a time of increasing athletic specialization, Tom Lafferty stands out as one of the outstanding Lowell High School athletes of the 1980's.

A three-year standout for Coach Walter Nelson's football team, Tom anchored the Red and Gray's offensive and defensive lines at his end position. A sure-handed receiver, Tom ranks in the top ten all-time in both career pass receptions and total career receiving yardage for Lowell High School. Tom earned both Lowell Sun All-Star and MVC All-Conference honors for the 1987 season.

As a key member of Coach Charlie Ryan's basketball squad, Tom was one of the catalysts for Lowell's successful run to the Division I North Sectional Championship in the 1987-1988 season. The team's co-captain, Tom earned MVC All-Conference honors as he led the Raiders in offensive and defensive rebounding, field goal percentage, and blocked shots.

Tom also performed as a hard-hitting outfielder on Coach George

Cunha's baseball teams during 1987 and 1988.

After graduation Tom enrolled at University of Massachusetts, Lowell, where he developed into a stellar tight end for Coach Dennis Scannell's Chiefs. A four-year starter, Tom earned Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Rookie of the Year honors in 1988. He was a three-year All-Conference selection in the competitive New England Football Conference. Tom culminated his collegiate career by serving as UMass Lowell's captain and earning All-New England honors (including all divisions) during his senior year. Among his school records at UMass Lowell were most pass receptions in a season and total career receptions. Tom's talents attracted numerous National Football League scouts and resulted in an invitation to the NFL Training Combine after his senior year.



LAURA TUCKER DESCHENEAUX CLASS OF 1991

One of the truly outstanding middle distance runners in the history of Lowell High School, Laurie Tucker Descheneaux achieved significant honors at the local, state, regional, and national levels during her careers at both Lowell High and later at University of

Massachusetts @ Lowell.

During her high school career Laurie was a dominant force in the Merrimack Valley Conference. She was a key performer (and senior team Captain) on the Red and Gray cross country team that won 3 consecutive MVC championships while compiling an overall 29-3 team dual meet record during her 4 years. Laurie also won 53 of 56 dual meet races during her indoor and outdoor careers. Laurie, a 9-time Lowell Sun All-Star and 8-time team MVP, won 12 varsity letters as a member of the Raider Cross and Track teams and was named as an MVC All-Conference selection 9 times. She held numerous school

records in a variety of events throughout her career.

Laurie also enjoyed considerable success beyond the local level. She led the Raiders to 3rd, 5th, and 4th place finishes at the Eastern Massachusetts Division I Cross Country Championships in 1988, 1989, and 1990 respectively. During the indoor and outdoor track campaigns, Laurie was a regular place winner at the Massachusetts State Championships in a variety of events ranging from the triple jump to the 1 mile run, highlighted by 2nd place finishes in the 600-yd. run (indoors) and 800 meters (outdoors) during her senior year (1990-1991). Laurie placed 3rd in the New England Championships in the 600 meters that indoor season as well. She was also a 2-time state champion (1989 and 1990) as a member of the Red and Gray 4 x 1 mile relay team. Laurie's 600 yd. time of 1.29.1 was ranked 19th nationally by Track and Field News in the 600 for the 1990-1991 season.

After graduation Laurie accepted a track scholarship to the University of Massachusetts @ Lowell where she continued her running exploits. During her 4-year career for the Riverhawks, Laurie compiled an enviable record. A 4-time team captain, Laurie won All-East honors 3 times and was an All-New England selection in 1994, helping lead UMass to Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Cross Country and Indoor Track

Championships

A high honors student majoring in Physical Therapy, Laurie was named the ECAC Robbins Scholar Athlete of the Year for 1994-1995. She was then named an Academic All-American in 1995. Along with her twin sister Lynn, Laurie was awarded the University of Massachusetts @ Lowell Athletic Scholarship Award at commencement, honoring them as the highest ranking student athletes during their 4 years at the university.

Laurie culminated her career by qualifying for the NCAA Division II National Championships in 1996 where her time of 2.11.79 narrowly missed All-American honors.

CLASS OF 1964

One of the truly outstanding baseball performers in the history of Lowell High School, Larry Connell etched his name indelibly in the Raider record books with a stellar career for Hall of Fame Coach Stanley Stoklosa.

During Larry's sophomore season (1962), the right-hander compiled a modest 3-3 record, performing mostly in

relief.

As a junior (1963) Larry performed on a relatively unsuccessful team but still managed 3 victories - half the team's total of 6.

As a senior (1964) Larry blossomed into the ace of a pitching staff that compiled

an incredible seasonal team earned run average of 1.10 (the 3rd best in school history) as the Red and Gray dominated the Essex County League en route to a league championship and an overall record of 19-5 (the 2nd most team

victories in LHS history).

Larry recorded perhaps the most outstanding single season pitching performance in the 117-year history of Lowell High School Baseball during the 1964 campaign. Larry compiled a record of 12-1 with an earned run average of 0.79. He recorded 159 strikeouts in 98 innings while hurling 13 complete games and 3 shutouts. He enjoyed a string of 22 consecutive shutout innings at one point.

Larry was also an offensive threat for the Red and Gray, leading the

team with a .388 batting average and 31 hits.

Larry's seasonal totals of 12 victories and 159 strikeouts still stand as Lowell High School records. His total of 98 innings pitched were the most by a Raider pitcher since 1914. His career total of 305 strikeouts ranks 2nd on the all-time LHS list. Larry also ranks near the top of the Raider record book in career wins (18), career innings pitched (228.1), and both seasonal (3) and career (4) shutouts.

In 1964, Larry pitched 4 games with 14 or more strikeouts. At his best in the big games, Larry hurled a no-hitter in a showdown against archrival Lynn Classical. He also threw a 4-hitter with 14 strikeouts in a key Essex County

contest with Peabody that cemented the Red and Gray's league lead.

It was in the Eastern Massachusetts State Class A Tournament that Larry was at his best. In the 1st round Larry hurled a complete game victory over Malden Catholic, striking out 10. He also had 2 hits, including a triple. In the quarterfinal contest against heavily favored Catholic Memorial, Larry hurled a 4-hitter, striking out 10, as he outdueled future major league standout Skip Lockwood in a 4-3 Raider victory. The game, viewed by more than 1,000 fans at Alumni Field, ranks as one of the top moments in LHS Baseball history.

Larry was named to both the Boston Globe and Record American All-

Scholastic teams after the season.

After graduation Larry signed a contract with the Boston Red Sox. He later played in the Baltimore Orioles farm system until an arm injury terminated a promising career.



ARTHUR CHARLES FARRIS CLASS OF 1968

Another member of the illustrious Lowell High School Class of 1968, Arthur Charles Farris joins numerous teammates in the LHS athletic Hall of Fame.

A 2-year member of Hall of Fame Coach Raymond Riddick's football teams, Art was a safety/wide receiver on the undefeated (9-0) Eastern Massachusetts Class A Champion Raider juggernaut that outscored its opponents by an incredible 299-12 margin on its way to establishing itself as perhaps the greatest gridiron powerhouse in LHS history. Art was one

of the catalysts of the Red and Gray defense that set seasonal school records for fewest points allowed (12) and most shutouts (7) during that phenomenal 1967 campaign. Defensively, Art had 3 interceptions, 1 fumble recovery and 26 tackles for the Raiders. On offense Art caught 1 touchdown pass in the primarily ground-oriented LHS attack. Art joins football teammates Rod Redman, Tom Whalen, Tim Green, Paul Lanoue, and Dennis Krysiak in the Hall of Fame.

It was as a member of Hall of Fame Coach John Lang's teams that Art made an indelible mark in the long history of LHS Track and Field.

As a member of the Raider Indoor Track team, Art enjoyed a much-heralded 2-year rein in the highly competitive North Shore League, regularly outclassing the competition in the 600-yd. run. As a junior (1966-67) Art placed 3rd in the 300-yd dash at the Massachusetts State Indoor Champion-ship. As a senior (1967-68) Art dominated the competition in the 600. He set a North Shore League record in the event, won the prestigious BAA Invitational Schoolboy 600 and then won the 600 at the Massachusetts State Indoor Championship. He culminated his indoor season by setting a school record while placing 3rd in the Eastern States Championship 600 in New York.

As a member of the Red and Gray Outdoor Track team, Art was again a dominant force. As a junior (1967) he won both the 440-yd. dash and the long jump at the Essex County League Championship. At the Massachusetts Class A State Championship Meet, Art led LHS to a 3rd place team finish, winning the long jump and placing 2nd in the 440. Art went onto place 3rd at the Massachusetts All-State Championship and 6th at the New England Championship in the 440. As a senior (1968) Art won both the long jump and the 440 at the Class A State Championship. He continued in the 440, winning the event at the All-State Championship Meet and placing 2nd at the New England Championship.



MARYBETH MCKENNEY-DONNELLY CLASS OF 1986

One of the premier pure sprinters in the history of the Lowell High School Girls Track program. Marybeth McKenney-Donnelly earned honors at the local, state, and regional levels in a career that continued from Lowell High to the University of Massachusetts @ Lowell.

As a 4-year standout for the Red and Gray Girls Indoor Track team, Marybeth was an instrumental part of consecutive Merrimack Valley Conference team championships (1982-83 and 1983-84). Marybeth earned MVC All-Conference honors in both 1984 and 1985 in the 4x440-yd. relay and in 1986 in both

the 4x440 relay and the 300-yd. dash. During her indoor career Marybeth set Lowell High School records in the 50-yd. dash and the 4x440-yd., 4x220-yd., and 4x50-yd. shuttle dash relays. The highlight of her career was the winning of 2 Massachusetts State Championship medals in 1985 as part of the 4x200 and 4x50 shuttle relays (the latter in a Massachusetts High School State Record time that still stands 17 years later). She also placed 5th in the 50-yd dash at the Massachusetts State Meet that year. A team Captain and Lowell Sun All-Star in 1986, Marybeth saw her LHS teams compile an overall record of 28-3 during her tenure.

As a 4-year varsity performer on the Raiders Outdoor Track team, Marybeth continued her excellence. Her victories in the 100-meter dash and as a part of the 4x100-meter relay team helped lead Lowell to the Northern Area Sectional Championship in 1985. During her senior season (1986) Marybeth (LHS Captain and MVP and Lowell Sun and MVC All-Star) was a part of 2 school record-setting relay teams (4x100- and 4x220-meters). The 4x100-meter team placed 5th (top New England team) at the prestigious Glen Loucks Invitational in White Plains, NY, and 3rd at both the Massachusetts and New England Championships. Individually, Marybeth placed 4th at the State Class A Championship in the 440-meter dash.

Marybeth developed into one of the outstanding sprinters in the history of the UMass @ Lowell Track and Field program. Marybeth won 8 UMass varsity letters. She was a three-time captain (1988, 1989, 1990) and was named the University's Track Student-Athlete-of-the-Year in 1990. She set UMass @ Lowell school records in the 55-meter and 220-meter dashes indoors and the 100-meter and 220-meter dashes outdoors. Marybeth dominated the all-time record lists for the Chiefs in all these events. She was a 6-time All-New England and 4-time All-ECAC (Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference) selection.

Marybeth has returned to Lowell High School as head coach of the Girls Cross-Country and Outdoor Track teams. Her 2002 Cross-Country team won an MVC Championship.



PAUL T. HALEY CLASS OF 1987

One of the leading Lowell High School athletes of the 1980's, Paul Haley earned honors at the state, regional, and national levels during a career as a legitimate 2-sport standout.

A 2-way starter at tackle on the Lowell High School football team, Paul was one of the driving forces behind Coach Walter Nelson's Merrimack Valley Conference Championship gridiron team in 1986. A 2-time winner of the Raiders' Outstanding Defensive Lineman Award (1985, 1986), Paul was selected to the Lowell Sun

All-Star football squad for the 1986 season.

As a member of Hall of Fame Coach George Bossi's Wrestling team, Paul earned a place for himself among the greats of that elite program. Paul won back-to-back Massachusetts State Championships in the heavyweight division in 1985-86 and 1986-87. Paul was an instrumental part of the Raiders' MIAA State Team Championship during the 1986-87 season. He was selected to the Boston Globe All-Scholastic team at the conclusion of the season. During the off-season Paul placed 2nd at the USA Wrestling National Freestyle Championships, earned All-American honors in the process.

After first attending American International College (AIC), Paul returned to His Lowell roots, transferring to UMass Lowell where he became one of the mainstays of the offensive line for Coach Dennis Scannell's powerhouse teams. Paul was chosen to the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) All-Star team for the 1989 season. He was elected as the team Captain for UMass Lowell for the 1990 season.



CLASS OF 1993

One of the premier athletes of the 1990's at Lowell High School, Leah Green becomes the 3rd member of her family to gain induction into the Lowell High School Athletic Hall of Fame. A true 3-sport standout, Leah earned local, state, and New England honors as a member of the Red and Gray volleybail, basketball, and track teams.

A key member of the Raider Volleyball team, Leah earned both MVC and Lowell Sun 2nd team honors as a sophomore (1991). As both a junior (1992) and a senior (1993) Leah was selected to both the MVC All-Conference Team and the

Lowell Sun All-Star Team. She was also named as the MVC's Most Valuable Player and the Sun's Player-of-the-Year for the 1993 season. Leah culminated her senior season by being selected to both the Boston Globe and the Boston Herald All-Scholastic Volleyball Teams, as well as being a 1st team selection for the All-New England Volleyball Team.

As a 4-year starter for the Lowell High Basketball team, Leah etched herself indelibly into the Red and Gray record book in a career that marks her as one of the most versatile hoopsters in the school's history. After scoring 246 points and gaining Lowell Sun All-Star honors during her sophomore season (1990-1991), Leah was named as the <u>Sun</u>'s Player-of-the Year in both her junior (1991-1992) and senior (1992-1993) years. Additionally, Leah was selected to the MVC's All Conference Team as a junior and as the league's Player-of-the-Year as a senior. Leah's senior season was perhaps the greatest in Raider history. Leah set school records in points (380), rebounds (255), points in a game (33), and foul shots attempted (154) while leading the Red and Gray into the State Tournament. Leah's name can be found in numerous other categories in the Raider record book, including career points (1038--the only female Lowell Hoopster to score 1000 career points).

As a member of the Lowell High Track team, Leah set a school record in the 300-meter hurdles. She finished 4th in that event in the Eastern Mass Class A Championship (1991). She also was a member of the Red and Gray 4x100

meter relay team that placed 4th in the Class A meet.

Leah was the recipient of the John Beaulieu Athletic Valedictory Award in 1993.

Leah attended Iona College in New Rochelle, NY, on a volleyball scholarship. Continuing her athletic exploits, Leah captained the Iona's Volleyball team during her junior and senior seasons. She was a 3-year member of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference All-Academic team and a MAAC All-Tournament Player in Volleyball and All-Conference selection in Water Polo in 1996. Leah culminated her college career by being chosen as the recipient of the Joseph O'Connell Award as the Outstanding Student - Athlete, Iona College in 1997.

Leah joins her father Timothy Green (LHS '67) and her brother Christopher Green (LHS '89) in the Lowell High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

JOHN JOSEPH NOONAN CLASS OF 1957

One of the many standout lineman who were the unsung heroes of the legendary teams of Hall of Fame Lowell High School Football Coach Ray Riddick, Jack Noonan followed up an outstanding career on the gridiron for the Red and Gray with an outstanding career of community service that impacted hundreds and perhaps thousands of young student athletes in the Greater Lowell area.

A 3-year starter and team leader at center offensively and middle linebacker defensively, Jack was one of the bulwarks

of the front lines of undefeated Red and Gray State Championship teams in both 1954 and 1956. Jack also manned those same positions during the 1955 campaign that saw the Raiders lose only once, the only time that Jack played in a losing game in his high school career.

In 1958, Jack was one of the founders of the Lowell Junior Football League. During the next 21 years Jack served as coach, scheduler, director, and CEO of the highly successful Junior League, which many felt was like a "minor league" for the Lowell High School football program. During his association with the Lowell Junior Football League and the Lowell Junior High School program, no fewer than 11 future Lowell High School Football captains, including future LHS Hall of Famers Bruce Brown and Bill Capone, benefited from the leadership and dedication of Jack Noonan.

Jack began officiating basketball games at the YMCA while still in high school in 1955. Jack later became a member of Lowell Board No. 95 of the International Association of Approved Basketball Official (IAABO). A highly respected basketball official at both the high school and college levels for 38 years. During that time Jack won numerous honors at the local and state levels in the IAABO, including 2 separate stints as Lowell Board 95's president. Jack's expertise was recognized at the state and national levels as he served on numerous committees during his tenure as an official.

In 1972, Jack received the prestigious "For God and Youth" Award from the Archdiocese of Boston for his outstanding contributions to Catholic youth based on his tireless efforts as Lowell area coordinator for all CYO Deanery athletic activities for nearly 15 years.

Finally, in 1999 Jack received the Massachusetts Interscholastic Athletic Association's Distinguished Service Award, an award presented to those select few who have demonstrated long term dedication to high school athletics.



BRIAN PATRICK DILLON CLASS OF 1974

One of the most consistent performers of the wrestling program of legendary Hall of Fame Coach George Bossi, Brian Dillon occupies a place among the mat elites of the Raiders during their long run of success.

As a sophomore (1971-1972) Brian placed 3rd in the prestigious Lowell Holiday Tournament. The young Raider then placed 1st at the Division I North-

east Sectional Championship. Brian finished his 1st full varsity season by placing 2nd at the Massachusetts State Tournament and 3rd at the New England Championships.

During his junior year (1972-1973) Brian enjoyed one of the most successful seasons in the long and storied history of Lowell Wrestling as he completed the season undefeated (36-0) on his way to winning Championships at the Lowell Holiday, Division I Northeast Sectional, Massachusetts State, and New England Tournaments in the 112-lb. weight class. One of 3 individual State Champions on the '72-'73 team, Brian played an instrumental role as the Red and Gray - just like Brian - completed the season undefeated, finishing the campaign 16-0 in dual meets and reigning as Team Champions at the Sectional, State, and New England Tournaments.

As a senior Brian, one of the team's co-captains, wrestled in the 121-lb. weight class. After winning his 2nd consecutive Lowell Holiday Tournament and 3rd straight Division I Northeast Sectional Title, Brian placed 5th in the State Tournament as the Raiders won their 2nd consecutive Team State Championship.

In Brian's 3 years of varsity competition, he compiled an overall personal career record of 95 wins and only 8 losses. The Red and Gray captured 3 Division I Northeast Sectional Championships (1972, 1973, 1974), 2 Massachusetts State Championships (1973, 1974) and 1 New England Championship (1973) during that time.



PAUL WILLIAM PICARD CLASS OF 1956

A true triple threat performer, Paul Picard was one of the standout quarterbacks for Lowell High School during the glory days of legendary Hall of Fame Coach Ray Riddick. During Paul's two years as the starting signal caller for the Raiders, Paul led the team to a 17-1 record, including an undefeated 9-0 run as Lowell won the State Championship during the 1954 campaign.

Paul was a gifted runner and passer. During an era when Lowell's success was primarily due to its dominating ground attack, Paul managed to compile impressive statistics through the air. During the State Championship season (1954) Paul threw for 628 yards and 5 touchdowns, including a 72-yd. aerial to Don Overlock. For his career Paul amassed 1,172 yards passing (6th on the all-time Lowell list). He set a single season school record for passing percentage (60.4%) in 1955 and a career record of 53.8%--marks that still stand today some 50 years later.

One of the outstanding punters in Lowell High School history, Paul was tabbed by at least one Boston newspaper columnist as the state's premier punter. His career best of 65 yards certainly did nothing to dispel that opinion.

Paul completed his Raider gridiron career in grand style at the annual Greater-Lowell vs. Greater-Lawrence All-Star Classic, winning the pre-game punting contest and then being named the game's MVP as he led Greater-Lowell to a 20-6 victory before more than 10,000 fans at Cawley Stadium.

In addition to his grid exploits, Paul was a standout high hurdler for Hall of Fame Track Coach George "Mike" Haggerty, completing the 1955-56 season undefeated for the Red and Gray.

Paul joins several LHS teammates in the Hall of Fame, including 1956 classmates John Freitas and Don Giuffrida and Walter "Herky" McGrade, John Maloney, and another of tonight's inductees, Jack Noonan, all from the class of 1957.



AMY E. LEKITES CLASS OF 1985

Perhaps the most outstanding sprinter/long jumper in the history of the Lowell High School Girls Track program, Amy Lekites inspired her teammates by her ability, dedication, loyalty, and leadership.

During her freshman and sophomore years, Amy was a contributing member of the Indoor and Outdoor Track teams. During her junior and senior years Amy blossomed into one of the most dominate performers in the tenure of Coach Jim McGuirk.

As a junior (1983-1984) Amy was undefeated indoors in the 300-yd.

dash in Merrimack Valley Conference dual meets. She won All-Conference honors in both the 300 and the 4 x 440-yd. relay and <u>Lowell Sun</u> All-Star honors in the 300.

Outdoors Amy continued her dominance, finishing the MVC dual meet season undefeated in the 200-meter dash and winning both MVC All-Conference and Lowell Sun All-Star honors in both the 200 and the long jump. Amy highlighted her season by winning both the 200 and the long jump and also running on the 1st place 4 x 100-meter relay team as the Raiders upset favored Lexington and Andover to capture the Northern Area Sectional Championship at Cawley Stadium. Amy then placed 4th in the long jump at the Eastern Mass

Class A State Championship.

As a senior (1984-1985) Amy (team captain) again dominated the MVC indoors in the 300, finishing undefeated for the 2nd consecutive season. She then captured that event at the Northern Area Championship before finishing 4th at the Massachusetts Class A Championship meet in both the 300 and as part of the Red and Gray's 4 x 400-meter relay team. The Lowell Sun Trackwoman-of-the-Year, Amy also won Massachusetts State Championship honors, joining teammates Patty Hagler and fellow Hall of Famers Mercedes Milligan Simmons and Mary Beth McKenney on the Raiders victorious 4 x 200-meter and 4 x 50-yd shuttle dash relay teams, the latter setting a Massachusetts State High School record that still stands almost 20 years later.

Outdoors Amy again enjoyed considerable success as team co-captain, winning both MVC and Lowell Sun All-Star honors in both the 200 and the long jump. Amy completed a run of 3 consecutive outdoor seasons as the Raiders leading scorer and earned her 4th consecutive team MVP award.

Tragically, Amy passed away less than a year after her graduation from Lowell High as the result of an automobile accident. The Amy E. Lekites Gymnasium at the Christa McAuliffe School in Lowell was dedicated in Amy's memory in 1994.



DANIEL CHRISTOPHER GRAHAM CLASS OF 1994

A rare legitimate three-sport standout in an era of increasing athletic specialization, Dan Graham won significant honors in a trio of sports during his

career at Lowell High School.

On the gridiron Dan was a fierce competitor at linebacker, compiling an amazing total of over 100 tackles during his senior year. Dan was named as a Merrimack Valley All-Conference selection. He also was selected to compete in the Carol Classic in 1994, and was a member of Team Massachusetts that competed in the America Bowl in Galway, Ireland, in 1994.

As a member of Hall of Fame Coach George Bossi's wrestling juggernauts, Dan twice took 2nd place in the Division I North Sectional Tournament and placed 2nd in the prestigious Lowell Holiday Tournament. He was also a member of a Raiders MVC Championship team and won Lowell Sun and MVC

All-Star honors.

Dan emerged as one of the finest catchers during the long career of LHS Baseball Coach George Cunha. During his senior campaign (1994) Dan, the team Captain and Coach's Award winner, won MVC and Massachusetts All-Star honors. Dan batted an impressive .383 and led the Red and Gray in runs scored (19), double (9), and walks (19), as Lowell recorded a record of 15-6 en route to the Massachusetts Division I Tournament. Dan finished his career at LHS with a .321 batting average.

Dan continued to display his athletic versatility at Central Connecticut University, playing both football and baseball at CCU, a rarity in NCAA Division I. Dan was the long snapper for the Blue Devils football squad, but it was as a member of Central Connecticut's baseball squad that Dan made an impact

that will not soon be forgotten in New Brittain.

A two-year Captain, Dan was a three-time All-Mid-Continent Conference selection, a two-time All-New England selection, a two-time All-Northeast

regional selection, and a 1998 Honorable Mention All-American.

In 1998 Dan compiled what might be the most incredible season in Central Connecticut history. In 45 games Dan led the team with a batting average of .409 (65-159) with 48 runs, 3 triples, 11 home runs, and 7 stolen bases. Dan also set CCU single-season records for hits in a season (65), RBI (56), and doubles (20). Dan also ranked 2nd all-time on the CCU lists for runs scored in a season (48), slugging percentage (.780), and home runs (11).


After graduation from Central Connecticut, Dan enjoyed a successful professional baseball career, performing for several independent teams in the Frontier League. Dan won numerous honors, including the Triple Crown for the Brockton Sox in 2003. Dan compiled a career .305 batting average during his

WILLIAM F. FUREY CLASS OF 1975

Another of Hall of Fame Coach George Bossi's standouts, Bill Furey was one of the mainstays of the Lowell High School teams that dominated the wrestling scene in Massachusetts and New England in the mid-1970's.

A two-way starter for legendary Hall of Fame Football Coach Ray Riddick, Bill was the Raider's leading pass receiver during the 1974 season.

It was on the wrestling mat, how-

ever, that Bill made his indelible mark in the history of Lowell High School athletics.

After being a contributing member of the Red and Gray's State and New England Championship team during his sophomore year (1972-1973), Bill became one of the key components during his junior and senior years as Lowell reeled off its 2nd and 3rd consecutive Massachusetts State Team Titles (1974 and 1975) and added yet another New England Championship (1975). During that time period the Raiders rolled to an impressive 44-meet winning streak.

Individually, as a junior (1973-1974) Bill compiled an overall record of 23-3-1 en route to a 1st place finish in the North Sectional Championship Meet and a 3rd place in the Massachusetts State Tournament in the 147 pound weight class.

As a senior tri-captain Bill reached the pinnacle of his sport. Compiling an overall record of 26-3-1, Bill was runner-up in the prestigious Lowell Holiday Tournament then ran the table by winning championships at the North Sectional, State, and New England Tournaments in the 147 pound weight class.

Bill's career won-lost record was an impressive 52-6-1.

Bill's accomplishments earned him a scholarship to Division I power Louisiana State University.

Bill joins teammates Cliff Whalen, Jeff Lambert, Brian Dillon, George Kacavas, Earle McQuaide, and one of tonight's other inductees-Brian McMahon--in the Hall of Fame.



BRIAN DAVID McMAHON CLASS OF 1978

Overcoming troublesome leg and hip problems as a youngster, Brian McMahon joined Hall of Fame Coach George Bossi's Lowell High School wrestling program as a freshman and proceeded to become one of the rarities, a four-year varsity performer for the Red and Gray.

Brian was a member of the Raiders Massachusetts State Championship team during his freshman year (1974-1975) and was part of Lowell's im-

pressive 44-meet win streak that spanned several seasons.

As a junior (1976-1977) Brian included a 1st place finish at the prestigious Wayland Christmas Tournament among his accomplishments.

As a senior co-captain in 1977-1978 Brian enjoyed an impressive season as he helped lead Lowell to another Massachusetts State team championship, book ending the one the Raiders won during his freshman season. Compiling an overall individual record of 29-3-1, Brian put together an improbable post-season performance. After finishing 2nd in the North Sectional Championships, Brian defeated 3 of the top 4 seeded wrestlers en route to winning the Massachusetts State Championship at 115 pounds. Not content to finish there, Brian advanced to win the 115-lb. Championship at the New England Tournament as well.

Referred to as "...the best wrestler in the state" by the knowledgeable Coach Bossi, Brian was named to both the <u>Boston Globe</u> and <u>Boston Herald American</u> All-Scholastic teams following the 1977-1978 season, as well as being named as the <u>Lowell Sun's</u> Wrestler of the Year.



KEVIN ROURKE CLASS OF 1991

A truly aifted athlete, Kevin Rourke stood out on both the hardwood and the diamond as one of Lowell High School's premier basketball and baseball player in recent history.

As a member of the Raider Basketball team, Kevin was a 3-year starter and 2time Merrimack Valley All-Conference and Lowell Sun All Star selection, regularly helping lead the Red and Gray into the Eastern Mass Division | Tournament.

As a member of the Lowell High School Baseball team, Kevin established himself as one of the most outstanding pitchers

in the school's long and storied baseball history. Kevin was one of the few 4year varsity performers in recent memory. During his first 3 seasons (1988-1990) Kevin battled periodic shoulder problems to compile a fine 10-6 overall record, including a perfect 3-0 during his freshman year. As a senior (1991) Kevin fashioned a superb season, finishing with a record of 8-1 with 65 strikeouts and an ERA of 1.27. An ever improving hitter, Kevin recorded a batting average of /338 with 1 home run and 15 RBI. Kevin was an instrumental part of Lowell's 17-5 season.

Kevin was a Merrimack Valley All-Conference choice in both 1990 and 1991. He was selected as the MVC and Lowell Sun Player of the Year as a senior in 1991. During Kevin's career at Lowell High the Red and Gray compiled an overall team record of 49-32 with Kevin accounting for 18 of those victories--nearly 40%. Kevin's name appears regularly in the Lowell High Baseball Record Book, including: 2nd in career shutouts (5), 3rd in career wins (18), 3rd in wins in a season (8), and 9th in career strikeouts (197).

After graduation, Kevin attended University of Massachusetts Lowell and embarked on a career for Coach Jim Stone's nationally ranked River Hawks that ultimately ranked him as one of the greatest hurlers in the school's history. A 4year varsity performer, Kevin (UMass Lowell's first career 20-game winner) ranks high in virtually every pitching category in the University's Record Book. Among those are: 1st in career starts (40), 1st in starts in a season (14), 1st in innings pitched in a season (102.1), 1st in victories in a season (10), 2nd in career victories (23), and 3rd in career strikeouts (190).

Kevin was named the New England Collegiate Conference Rookie of the Year in 1992 and was a NECC All-Conference selection in both 1994 and 1995. Additionally, in 1995 Kevin was chosen as UMass Lowell's MVP and

earned All-New England honors.

Kevin joins his sister-in-law Laurie Tucker Descheneaux (LHS '91) in the Hall of Fame.



JAMES SCOTT BORODAWKA CLASS OF 1992

First touted on the pages of Sports Illustrated magazine as a high-scoring 10-year old soccer star, Jim Borodawka grew up to become one of the most proficient back court performers in the proud history of Lowell High School Basketball.

A three-year starter at guard for the Red and Gray, Jim handed out the 4th highest seasonal assist total in school history as a sophomore point guard (1989-1990), helping lead the Raiders to the semi-finals of the Division I North State Tournament.

As a junior (1990-1991) Jim continued his stellar play at the point, shooting a school record 64% from the field as Lowell averaged almost 80 points per game en route to a 19-1 regular season record.

During the 1991-1992 campaign, Jim recorded one of the finest individual seasons in school history. Jim, the team captain, scored a LHS record 554 points, averaging 26.4 points per game and leading all Eastern Mass Division I scorers despite regularly facing double and often triple team defenses. Jim earned All-Scholastic honors in both the Boston Globe and Boston Herald, as well as being chosen as the Lowell Sun's Player of the Year and a Merrimack Valley All-Conference selection.

Jim ranks high in the LHS Basketball Record Book in numerous categories, highlighted by school records in 11 categories, including most points in a season, highest single season scoring average, virtually every school record in foul shooting and three-point shooting, and career assists.

After graduation Jim captained Bridgton Academy in Maine, averaging 27.6 ppg and earning All-New England Prep honors.

Jim went on to an outstanding career at UMass-Lowell, scoring over 1200 points. As a sophomore he led NCAA Division I and II in four shooting percentage (92.5%), the only player in the history of the University to lead the nation in any statistical category. As a senior team captain Jim led the River Hawks to a 20-win season and the ECAC Division II Championship.

Jim finished his career high in the UMass-Lowell Record Book in many categories, including 1st in career foul shooting percentage, a stat in which he led the New England Collegiate Conference for his final three seasons.



CLASS OF 1994

Kerry Conlin was a giant on the soccer field, the basketball court, and the track during her outstanding career at Lowell High School.

As a member of the Raider Soccer team, Kerry was a Merrimack Valley Conference All-Star as a sophomore (1991) and won MVC All-Conference honors in 1992. The team captain, Kerry was selected as the MVC and Lowell Sun Player of the Year in 1993, when she was also chosen as a member of the Eastern Massachusetts All-Star Team. Kerry led Lowell to its first

ever Eastern Mass State Tournament in 1993. She scored the games only goal in Lowell's 1-0 victory over arch-rival Billerica as the Red and

Gray advanced to the guarterfinals.

A standout point guard on Lowell's basketball squad, Kerry earned MVC All-Star honors in 1992-93 and All-Conference honors, as well as Lowell Sun All-Star status, in 1993-94. As a senior captain, Kerry helped lead Lowell to the quarterfinals of the Eastern Mass Division I Tournament during the 1993-94 season.

During her senior year Kerry participated in Outdoor Track and

earned MVC All-Star honors in the javelin.

As a result of her career efforts Kerry received the prestigious Valedictory Athletic Award in 1994, presented annually to Lowell High School's most outstanding graduating senior female and male athletes.

After graduation Kerry attended Merrimack College, where she continued her exploits on the soccer field. A four-year starter for Merrimack, Kerry became one of New England's top collegiate players during an outstanding career. Kerry was a 2nd team All-Northeast Conference selection as a sophomore (1995). She was named 1st team All-Northeast Conference in both 1996 and 1997. She was also chosen as 2nd team All-New England in 1997. During her junior season (1996) Kerry was a star forward on the Merrimack team that was ranked #5 nationally and competed in the NCAA Division 2 Elite 8 Tournament. Kerry finished her career at Merrimack as the school's 5th all-time leading point scorer (106) and set school records for most goals in a game (4) and fastest goal scored in a game (62 seconds).

After graduation Kerry returned to serve as the Girls' Junior Varsity
